A gathering of residents and friends said "farewell" to the local postal delivery service on 17th July 1986 at the Village Hall when recognition was given to Mrs Edie Goodband and Mr Bernard Mastin for their services over many years.

Opening the proceedings Mrs Irene Elliott said that she was delighted to see those present and thanked all those who had given so generously to the collection. She was pleased that the idea had come from the younger members of the community, Liss Gill Burgess, Mrs Ruth Tysoe and Mrs Jane Norris. Mrs Elliott then introduced the Vicar Rev Peter Wright who made the presentations. He said that it was both a sad and a happy occasion.

It was sed because it marked the end of an era in the village life and eroded yet another personal service yet happy at the appreciation we were showing this evening. Villagers had been able to rely on the contact of a personal friend in Edie as "our post lady" for some 38 years. The Vicar then presented Mrs Goodband with a cheque for £160.

Of Mr Mastin, Rev Wright said that however bad the weather, however thick the snow, Mr Mastin has always got through with the mail, and then presented him with a cheque for £60. Mrs Hallam, 79 the oldest lady living in the village, then presented Mrs Goodband, Mrs Mary Mastin and Mrs Kath Arnold, relief post lady with a bouquet of flowers.

Editorial

TIMES THEY ARE A'CHANGING

'I suppose it all started with Dr Beeching's axe. At a stroke branch railway lines disappeared and rural communities suffered. Everybody was expected to travel by an 'improved' bus service, but come October this year and the deregulation of bus services, it seems likely that rural bus services will suffer.

Closer to home we have, as reported elsewhere, lost another local asset, the village postal delivery service with its friendly postman/ woman with their local knowledge who knew us individually as neighbour and friend. And other villages seem likely to follow suit.

Large villages also used to have their own village bobby - Coddington was no exception - the police house is just another residence now. Many have lost their school, village shop and pub, but here we are still lucky.

However, another threat lurks near. A developer is seeking to demolish the Beacon Hill Service Station and garage by the A1 and A17 and build 39 houses instead. Another local amenity under threat.

Thus raral amenities are becoming depleted - and strangely enough at a time when the large urban communities such as Mersyside, Greater London, Tyne and Wear, Greater Manchester, West and South Yorkshire are experiencing a decline in urban population.

Where are they going? Evidence suggests that those leaving are seeking a new life in the Shire Counties; in rural areas where there are no longer adequate shops, schools or transport services to serve the needs of the rural population.

Alan Waddington has taken over the editorship of the Coddington Community News and can be contacted at the address given on the back page.



WELCOME

We welcome Mr Richard Gray to the Parish Council at the recent byelection held at the end of June. The by election was caused by the resignation of Mr David King.

Parish Council Clerk, Mrs Ruth Tysoe said that only 131 out of 880 electors turned out and this was disappointing. Mr Gray polled 60 votes Mrs Karen Marsh 49 and Mr Alan Waddington 22.



A17 LINK ROAD - CODDINGTON BYPASS

The Secretary of Sate for Transport will shortly publish revised proposals for side roads affected by the line of the A17 link road.

They include variation to footpath 4A, and access to the houses Gilwern and Peacehaven near Stapleford Lane to be via Folly Farm Lane. New signs at Stapleford Lane will direct Newark bound traffic to use the link road.

The line of the A17 link would also be amended within the area of South Airfield Farm, and an overbridge would be constructed to join the two areas of farmland divided by the new road. There would also be gated accesses to both Hall and Manor Dairy Farms on either side of the A17 link road.

Consultation would take place with the owners and other interested parties with regard to the schemes outlined above. Work on the A46 (Newark Relief Road) is expected to start towards the end of next year.

VILLAGE HALL

The Villege Hall Committee are in the process of arranging to renew the sheeting on the roof of the kitchen and toilet section of the Hall and hope to have this completed during the Summer Holiday period.

The Committee would like to thank everyone who has attended the Bingo sessions in aid of the Village Hall Fund Raising which has helped towards the cost of the roof.

The next Bingo session is on Thursday 18th September at the Village Hall commencing at 7.30p.m.

Mr Cook warned local people that there is a simple way to allow NIREX to succeed. "It will happen for them if you simply do nothing".





CIVIL WARS

You may have seen from a recent Midweek Advertiser that plans for a Civil War Festival have been put back from 1987, which incidentally is the anniversary of the Battle of East Stoke to 1988.

Coddington played a small part in the siege of Newark in 1644, for Prince Rupert, at the head of some 6500 troops, marched to outflank Sir John Meldrum with 7000 men, who was laying siege to the town. Rupert occupied Beacon Hill with part of his troops whilst the remainder marched past Coddington windmill and to the east of what is now Nicholson's Lake to circle around to support Newark from the North East.


The Battle of East Stoke anniversary in June next year marks the final battle in another civil war - The war of the Roses. Although the Battle of Bosworth saw the defeat of Richard 111, the Battle of East Stoke established Henry V11 as the King of England.


FOR NEW RESIDENTS
