

PARISH COUNCIL'S CONFERENCE ON

THE COMMUNITY CHARGE

A BRIEFING

Community Charge or poll tax is here whether we like it or not, however it may not be the ogre we expect. It commences April 1st 1990 but in late May early June every household will receive a registration form to be returned to the Registration Officer. He will then compile a register of all those liable for Community Charge. Details held in the register are strictly confidential, you can only see your own entry. All persons 18yrs and over (with some exceptions) will receive the same bill for their personal Community Charge to be paid in 10 mnthly instalments unless elected otherwise. Full time students will pay 20% of a full year at their term address; those over 18yrs and at school and those in residential care and nursing homes are totally exempt.

Around December 1989 all those receiving housing benefit, income support and pensions will receive a form so they can claim Community Charge Benefit making them liable for 20% of their charge. Further claims on the amount will be through D.S.S.

Another charge is Standard Charge which applies to those who own more than one home e.g. holiday home or empty house and they will be charged at 0,0.5,1,1.5,or 2 times the local single persons charge.

And finally, a business or National Non Domestic Rate will, judged on a rental value but updated every 5yrs. Those running a business from home will be subjected to Composite Charges i.e. the living accomodation at personal rate and that area designated for business on National Non Domestic Rate.

So where does the money go? It is calculated from the sum of all the expected expenditure of the County; District and Parish Councils then divided by the eligible population giving the Community Charge (with few deductions). For the year 1989/1990 the Community Charge in Coddington for a single person/pensioner would have been £257 and per married couple £514.

No doubt, individuals will wish to find out more, a road show can be organised through the Parish Council if enough people show an interest. It includes slides, talks and the officer on duty will try to answer any questions and concerns you may have. The District Council have set up a help-line on or via Newark 605111.
