Coddington Parish Council

Coddington Parish Council notes (in brief):

1) The Gravel Pit, Balderton Lane.

Background: In March 1982 Nottinghamshire County Council informed the F.C. that the land was unclaimed and that the F.C. were OBLIGED to "adopt it". For many years the F.C. had in fact been undertaking management of the area but had never felt the need to take formal control of the area. In 1983 a tree planting scheme was started with the cooperation of the County Council and the Nottinghamshire Trust for Nature Conservation.

It was resolved at the beginning of the year to take possession of the land in the interests of the village community. The P.C. is thus intending to follow the legal process for adoption and the following steps have been proposed, seconded, passed and minuted:

- a) A formal resolution that the council takes possession from April 5th, 1989.
- b) The council undertakes to enter the land to carry out minimum maintenance.
- c) After due notice in the local paper a sign will be erected on site with the words "Coddington Farish Council Council Property".

Management and maintenance needs to be practised over a subsequent twelve year period, after which the P.C. becomes the legal owner by virtue of adverse possession in accordance with the Limitation Act, 1980.

2) Rural Housing.

There has been much concern recently about the lack of suitable housing provision in rural areas. A particular problem has been the inability of young couples, born in local parishes, to acquire either public housing or starter homes in the vicinity.

In order to clarify the situation and to spotlight the problem the F.C. decided that a housing survey might be a realistic means of obtaining data. It is hoped to produce a standard questionnaire and canvass the whole parish. An analysis of the information would be sent to the appropriate authorities.

Housing and opportunities within the village are an issue that need to be addressed with some seriousness. A village response will show Kelham and County Halls that we care about our lives, our children and our old folk and that we hope that they will respect and give our collective views the proper consideration.

Litter is a very emotive issue. Nobody likes it and it seems to be a problem that wont go away. In Coddington it is seen as a "formidable problem" and the responsiblity for control and clearance is a real "hot potato" for all local and minor authorities. Avoiding the issue doesn't solve the problem. So, the Parish Council is hoping to debate the issue at the Annual Parish Meeting, on April 4th, and subsequently come up with some proposals for combatting the problem within the parish.

4) Donations

The precept having been set for 1989/90 the F.C. was able to release monies from its deposit account in order to support village organisations. Having heard excellent representations from Harvey Avenue Mothers and Toddlers Group, the Harvey Flaygroup and the Coddington Flaygroup and Rising 5's, Avenue it proposed and passed that donations of #150 be given to each of the three groups.

N.B. It is hoped that community organisations like those above will contribute articles to the CCN in order to publicise their events and activities.
