MINERAL EXTRACTION

There will be a public meeting at 7.30p.m. on Tuesday 16th February to discuss plans by ARC Ltd. to extract aggregate from agricultural land situated between Drove Lane and Stapleford Land with access to Drove Land adjacent to the line of the A17 Relief Road.

The proposal is to develop a "Borrow Pit" to supply aggregates for use in the construction of the Newark Relief Road followed by restoration to a landscaped water area.

In a similar case at Fotheringhay, Northamptonshire, an Amey Roadstone Corporation spokesman has said that the "overwhelming need for aggregates overrides grounds for refusal of permission" for their application.

Fotheringhay, mentioned in the Domesday Book was where Richard III was born and Mary Queen of Scots was beheaded.

WELLGREEN/MORGANS CLOSE

The County Council are considering a trial mini bus service on one or two days per week from the Wellgreen/ Morgans Close area of the village to Newark.

CIVIL PROTECTION

The County Council Civil Protection Officer will be holding an illustrated meeting with the Parish Council and villagers at 7p.m. on Tuesday 19th April. This will form pert of the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on the same day.

TREE PRESERVATION

Concern has been expressed by the Parish Council at a proposal of the owners of a property in the village to have a tree preservation order rescanded and a number of trees felled.

The proposal is to cut down six of thirteen preserved o oak trees which front onto Brownlows Hill and which it is alleged might affect the structure of the house.

In addition it is their intention to remove 2 apple trees, 1 pine tree, 1 silver birch tree a number of cypress trees and a preserved mature willow from the front garden.

The Council have objected to the removal of the six preserved oak and other trees which they consider makes a significant visual amenity to this part of the village, whilst noting that the same consulting engineer had given conflicting information regarding the strengthening of the house foundations in 1977 and last year.

The District Council consider that the onus is on the Parish Council to produce evidence of the conditions referred to in 1976/77 whilst the Parish Council felt that the onus lay with the Planning Department.

It was considered that the trees should not br removed until there was firm evidence that the oak trees were damaging the house.

HEAVY LORRIES

Although there is concern at the number of heavy lorries using Main Street, Brownlows Hill to Balderton, Mr. Skellern Assistant Director of Planning and Transportation told the Parish Council that no further weight restrictions could be considered until the A17 relief road was built.

Mrs Smith, Parish Councillor, also said that there were problems with heavy lorries using Old Newark Road, and that the width of the road near the A1 was as bad if not worse than the corner of Main Street, near Charity Farm.

The general concensus was that even with the A17 relief road, the problem would not diminish.

LEMON CHEESECAKE SLICES.

4oz Shortcrust pastry
8oz marzipan
3oz cream cheese
2 eggs, seperated
juice and rind of one lemon

2oz sugar 1 tabhespoon plain flour 1 tablespoon milk icing sugar for dusting

Chill pastry, roll out and use to line 7" square tin.
Set oven to Gas Mark 3 or 325F. Divide the marzipan in half and roll each half to a 7" square.
Place one marzipan square over the pastry in the tin. Cream the cheese in a large bowl, beat in the egg yolks, lemon rind, juice, sugar flour and milk. Whisk the egg whites until stiff and fold into cheese mixture. Spoon half the mixture over marzpan in the tin, top with second half of marzipan, then spoon remaining mixture on top. Bake in centre of oven for lhr. Dust with icing sugar before serving and cut into 12 slices.

GARDEN FENCING
