#### ANNUAL REPORT

## ADMINISTRATION & FINANCE

Mrs. Sue Kemp took over as Clerk in June 1989 \*

The Parish Council requested and received a Precept of £1,600 for the coming year. The yearly accounts were passed at the A.G.M. and have been presented for audit.

## PLANNING & ENVIRONMENT

24 Planning Applications have been received in the previous year, and been processed by the Parish Council.

## Newark Local Plan

A Public Meeting was held on 31st July 1989 at which 45 Parishioners attended. The Parish Council have submitted a document covering all the points that were made to the District Council. The revised plan has been delayed due to the problems associated with the proposed new village on the site of Balderton Hospital. The final report is due to be presented during the Summer. Parishioners who wish to comment on the document will be allowed 6 weeks to respond after publication. Copies will be available for viewing in Public Libraries and at Kelham Hall.

## Tree Planting Scheme

75 trees have now been planted around the village at Harvey Avenue Estate, Balderton Lane, Drove Lane and Valley View. 100 + are to be planted in the next year.

N.B. The trees have survived quite well. Only 5 have, so far, been damaged but more crucially they are all suffering stress from a water shortage. It would be gratefully appreciated, by the trees in particular (!), if parishioners could pour the occasional bucket of waste washing up water over the roots ......

# ALLOTMENTS & OPEN SPACES

The Parish Council rents land from the District Council for use as Allotments. Anyone wishing to rent an allotment should contact Mr. B. Allen.

## TRANSPORTATION & SERVICES

## Drove Lane

The Parish Council totally supports the demand for lighting and/or bollards at this junction. County Councillor Mrs. Yates and Mr. Alexander M.P. supported our campaign and the Department of Transport agreed to locate bollards.

The campaign will continue as we consider the junction to be a potential accident "black spot".

#### Litter Bins

5 extra bins have been provided by the District Council and the Parish Council have purchased 2 Topsy letter box bins, which are to be situated at the school and the shop.

#### Litter Warden

The Parish Council successfully applied for a grant from the District Council to help towards the cost of a Litter Warden. Mr. N. Hessey took up this post on 12 December 1989 and at present works 4 å a 1/2 hours per week (although this is under review)

#### Bus Stops

The Parish Council fully supported the petition of 60 signatures raised by Mrs. Parratt, concerning the bus stops on Old Newark Rd. The County Council are unwilling to alter the present situation and this matter is ongoing.


## Coddington Church of England School

No report was made available for the A.G.M. because the Governors have decreed that "members of the Governing Body are not individually responsibe to their electing bodies and should not report details of the school to such bodies"

## Beaconsfield Community Centre

This is to be demolished and a new centre built within one year. The Parish Council helped towards emergency repairs due to the breach of fire regulations.

(See later report from the B.C.A.)



This has been another successful year for the Association. Some activities held in the centre last year have carried on and continue to flourish; others have started during the course of the year and are getting stronger. All the activities are important for the whole village community.

## Activities held at the Centre include:-

The Play Group - held each Wednesday and Friday morning

The Mother and Toddler Group - this was started by Playgroup mums and has been running successfully for about two months. This meets on a Thursday morning (A "Women's Group" associated with Mother and Toddlers, has been set up. Anybody interested? Come along on a Thursday morning and find out more)

The Beaconsfield Youth Club is up and running and receives support from the Area Youth and Community Service (See later)

The Tenants Association and the Parish Council regularly hold their meetings at the centre.

At major holiday times the Playscheme Committee stage a Playscheme and these are always a great success.

This year we have also seen the Scouts Gala Day held at the centre and we hope that this might become an annual event.

This year the Association Committee (and friends) have been busy lobbying the Distrist Council for changes to the "HUT". After a great deal of gentle (and sometimes not so gentle!) persuasion we have managed to get the Council to agree to fund the building of a new Community Centre, for whole Village use. Building will commence towards late Summer and it is hoped that it will be completed and fitted by early Spring. (Which will be a great relief as the existing building might not survive a severe winter!) Details of the building and plans can be obtained from the secretary of the Association (Mrs. Steph. Checkley)

The Annual report ends with a note of thanks to all those who have helped with activities in the centre and to all Officers and Members of the Committee for all their hard work. A special thanks is given to the officers and members of the District Council who have supported the Association throughout the year.

The coming year will see the opening of the new centre and it is to be hoped that this will prove to be the start of an exciting new era for the Beaconsfield Community Association, the Village and for the

area it serves.



## BEACONSFIELD YOUTH CLUB

This has been running since Christmas in coordination with the County Council Leisure Services.

The club has qualified Youth Workers to help and they have organised trips and activities such as:

Whitewater rafting at Holme Pierepoint, rock climbing with qualified instructors in Derbyshire, football training at Nottingham Forest Football Club, and visits to Nottingham for ice-skating and the cinema. Each week some form of competition is held - pool, snooker, darts, table tennis, etc.

Monies for the club has been raised by sponsored events and profits from the Snack Bar and new equipment has been purchased with help from the Princes Trust, in Nottingham.

We have a membership of 43 - 45 in the senior group (age 14 onwards) and 8 - 10 in the junior section (age 11 - 14). Children come from all over the village, some from Balderton and a number from Beacon Heights. Any news faces will be welcomed.

The Youth Club meets on Friday evenings from 7 - 10 p.m. Hopefully, with extra help, we might be able to open on another night. Are there any volunteers?
