

#### CODDINGTON VOLUNTEER CAR SCHEME

It hardly seems a year since this was launched last year in the CCN, but it is a shame that, on this anniversary, it has been decided to close the Scheme until further notice.

This is due to a culmination of problems that have arisen during the year such as withdrawal of volunteers for personal reasons. With no replacements coming forward, the uptake of the service was restricted (largely) to very few in our community.

Unfortunately, it is not a viable proposition for the remaining volunteers, who have stated that they will continue to support the Scheme out of their own pockets, to continue. It is hoped, in the short term, with careful planning and negotiation that a similar scheme operating in Collingham can take up where CVCS left off. It is hoped that in the future with a new coordinator and more volunteers coming forward to take over the mantel of the CVCS, it might possibly start up again.

# CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL REVIEW 1998-99

Parish Councillors have represented the Parish at a number of local group meetings and discussion forums including Coddington United Charities, Coddington Village Hall Trust, Coddington Village Millennium Committee, etc. In formal Parish meetings councillors have given more than forty hours each in attendance time and with responsibilities towards other meetings and preparation time a considerable amount of voluntary effort has been attached to the role of local Parish Councillor.

The Parish Council has dealt with fifteen Planning applications and responded to Parishioners concerns and issues including:

The loss of Warden support at Wellgreen
Circular walk and footpaths
Cars parking at the School
Tree planting within the Parish
Traffic calming, weight restrictions - Note: This will, not go away, the Parish
Council will not be quiet!

Grass cutting, Street Cleaning, Litter and Dog Fouling.

The Parish Council has supported, with grants, the Scouts, the WellGreen Community Club, All Saints' PCC, the DARE campaign and have sponsored a youngster to Borneo.

The Parish Council has held regular discussions with the local Police on local crime issues - eighty nine reported crimes for Coddington. 'Not high' we are told but too many we believe.

We have a successful village newsletter (the CCN) reaching all within the Parish (thanks to Yvonne Jackson and Pam Hemphill)

At the end of this particular year, with a new Council formed in May, it is right and appropriate for me to thank the whole Council for their effort, care, good sense, enthusiasm and humour.

I would also wish to include my sincere thanks to our District and County Councillors who have worked so hard and effectively for all residents of the parish - restoring, somewhat, our faith in local democracy and local government.

A final postscript is to note, with sadness, the death of Roland Carver, Vice Chair to Coddington Parish Council. Steady and sure, we will all miss the qualities of reason and reasonableness that he brought to our meetings.

#### The Thorpe Family of Coddington

I would like to continue looking at different aspects of the history of the village and in this newsletter I am going to look at the influence of the Thorpe family on Coddington in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

The Thorpes were a very wealthy family who moved into Coddington in the 1840's. They bought Beaconsfield House (now known as the Old Hall in the woods behind Newark Road). The Thorpes lived the life of the landed gentry and employed a number of live-in servants including a footman, coachman, groom, cook, housemaid and kitchen maid.

James Thorpe owned a considerable proportion of the land in Coddington. The extensive grounds of the house were planted with ornamental trees, some of which are still standing. Having inherited 'Beaconsfield House' on the death of his father, James Thorpe built a large house in Coddington for his mother, which was known as Coddington House (Balderton Lane) - Beaconsfield house then became known as Coddington Hall.

The Thorpes were very influential and played an important part in reviving the religious life of the village. All Saints Church was in a state of neglect whilst the Methodist Church on Chapel Lane was flourishing. James Thorpe was largely responsible for the rebuilding of All Saints during the 1860's. The Church had fallen into decline during the 18th and early 19th centuries with services being held only once every 2 weeks and the fabric of the church being in a state of disrepair. With the arrival of the Thorpes things improved for the better - James Thorpe spent over £2,000 on repairs to the church and also donated gifts towards stained glass windows for the church. With the Thorpes, therefore, came a religious revival of Coddington Church and Parish.

The Summer Term is now well under way and promises to be a busy and exciting time.

#### **Whitby 1999**
