

CODDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2001-2002

This has been another busy year for the Parish Council. During the year we reluctantly accepted the resignation of Mrs Mary Carver. Mary had been a Councillor for many years and was a valued member. We were very sorry to see her go. In her place we have Mr David Hedge, who is already making a major contribution to the work of the Parish Council

Now a brief run-down of the Parish Council's work over the year.

<u>Code of Practice</u> – The Parish Council will be adopting the Government's Code of Practice for Parish Councils at its May meeting. Each member of the Council will also have to sign their personal acceptance. If they decline to do so, they have to resign.

<u>Increase in Parish Council members</u> – From May 2003, the Parish Council will be increased from 9 to 10 members.

<u>Jubilee Commemoration</u> – The Parish Council will be presenting commemorative mugs to all the children who attend Coddington School, and commemorative plates for the Teachers. The Parish Council also hopes to plant 50 oak trees along either side of Drove Lane, which will present a lasting memento of the Jubilee.

<u>Valley View</u> - Work is in progress to provide lighting and improved facilities for vehicular movement at Valley View. The Parish Council is indebted to our District and County Councillors, Maureen and Vincent Dobson, whose efforts have achieved these improvements.

Highway matters – The Parish Council continues to pressure County Council for a weight restriction on the C208 along with reduced speed limits and traffic calming measures. The problems of speeding and inappropriate traffic on Balderton Lane is also being brought to the attention of the Highway Authority. The Parish Council, along with our County Councillor will not give up on urging the need for these measures and we can only hope that persistence pays off.

<u>Charity Farm</u> – Sadly, the Parish Council has been unable to accept the terms offered by the Coddington United Charity for leasing or buying this land for the village. It was considered that leasing for only 5 years was pointless and a waste of money, and the price of the land was beyond that which the Parish Council could afford or justify.

<u>School Travel Plan</u> – A Steering Group, on which the Parish Council is represented, has been formed to progress the School Travel Plan.

<u>Thorpe Oaks</u> – This development is well underway and the first house should be occupied during the summer. The development is scheduled for completion within 3 to 4 years.

Yew Wood – The Parish Council is growing increasingly concerned about the future of this unique woodland. It suffers from tipping and arson. The owner has been requested to prepare a plan for its Management and Maintenance but to date there is no plan. The Parish Council has therefore asked the District Council to compulsorily acquire the wood to secure its safety.

Other members of the Parish Council will be telling you about further projects that are in hand such as the Millennium Garden, play equipment for Thorpe Close, house numbering and this year's garden competition.

I will end by thanking all my colleagues on the Parish Council for their hard work and support over the year.

PUT YOUR FEET FIRST

Sharon Foster is a fully qualified and registered Chiropodist with the Institute of Chiropodists and Podiatrists, providing treatments in the comfort of your own home. Both Chiropody and Podiatry deal with the examination, diagnosis and treatment of conditions and functions of the feet. The feet are one of the most vulnerable parts of the body, yet most people neglect them, with inappropriate footwear being the main contributing factor.

Not all foot pains are caused by corns and callouses. The human foot consists of 26 bones bound together by ligaments, supported by muscles and supplied with blood vessels and nerves. It is therefore subject to considerable strain and injury. Your feet are perfectly designed for everyday walking and sporting activities, but the demands placed on them are heavy. For each mile you run, your feet will hit the ground about 1,500 times and with each step, your foot will absorb a force several times your body weight. An 11 stone man of average size will process 112 tonnes of weight through each limb per mile.

There are a number of good reasons to visit a Chiropodist on a regular basis, even before common foot ailments such as corns or in-growing toenails become painfully apparent. Less widely appreciated is the fact, that many serious conditions are first manifested by symptoms that first appear in the feet. Regular consultations with a Chiropodist could well highlight any potential health problems before they become apparent.

Ten Little Piggy Foot Facts

- 1. The average adult takes in excess of 18,000 steps a day and it's even more for kids.
- 2. Most feet walk about 70,000 miles in a lifetime that's four times around the earth.
- 3. With every mile you walk, you shift approximately one hundred tonnes (the weight of a Blue Whale) just by moving your own body weight forward.
- 4. Around 70% of foot problems come from wearing the wrong footwear or ill-fitting shoes. The majority of these are caused by ill-fitting footwear worn as a child.

- 5. In the time it takes to make a cup of tea a child may have crawled a quarter of a mile (400 metres).
- 6. A 'first walker' takes 176 steps each minute.
- 7. Each adult foot has 26 bones, 19 muscles, over 100 ligaments and thousands of nerve endings.
- 8. At birth feet contain only 22 partially formed bones.
- 9. There are more sweat glands per square inch on our feet than anywhere else on the body (250,000 to be exact) and the average pair gives off about half a pint of perspiration a day.
- 10. Children's feet should be checked for size and fitting every 6-8 weeks in early years. Children's feet often grow faster in the spring and summer, and sometimes hardly at all in the winter.

The major happening this coming year is the change in the progressive training throughout the age range and later the introduction of the new section (14-18 years)


Our Project for the year is to renew the fencing around the back of the hall, so please watch out for our Quiz Nights etc.

A Message from Coddington Post Office

Well, here we are just over a year after moving to Coddington. And it has been a very eventful sixteen or seventeen months indeed it has to be said. So many new people we have met and welcomed into the Post Office and shop. It has been a great period for us and seeing the shop develop with the help of our growing customer base is very satisfying. The shop can look good and be well stocked with all the things you require but without your support and goodwill we are nothing. So, first of all, a very big thank you to all our customers for making it more bearable in trying to make the business viable.

Some good news regarding the Post Office. As you are all probably aware Post Office Lrd as part of Consignia is undergoing major changes, which will affect everyone who uses or is employed in the Post Office network. It is an unsettling period for a lot of sub-masters and Royal Mail employees so it was good news when I received a letter from Consignia informing me that Coddington PO is regarded as a rural office and, as such, will be unaffected by the proposed office closure scheme currently underway.

We will, however, see major changes as the state benefits in their current form (benefit books) are withdrawn from post offices over the next year or so. This does not mean that if you currently like to draw a benefit in cash that you will no longer be able to do so. The benefit will have to be paid into a bank account but both the government and the post office recognize that it is important that people can still draw cash from their local post office. You WILL still be able to do this and the post office will offer the facility for a basic bank account from which clients can draw cash using a personalized swipe card. This area of personal banking is the very future for all post offices and it is the clear intention of the network and the government to provide a community banking system. This also has approval from all the major banks. Watch this space!!! Don't forget we also offer many other services from the Post Office such as Bureau de Change, Bill payments, TV licensing, phone cards, etc. and all your postage requirements to anywhere in the world.

As a business we are always looking for other services and products which we think will enhance the village shop. Did you know that we sell local bread, milk and bacon and sausages? It will always be our intention to sell this type of product whenever we can obtain them. We also provide a dry cleaning agency for Balderton Dry Cleaners, again using a local business.

Anyway, it is a pleasure for us both to live and work in a splendid community which itself if undergoing major changes which I am sure will enhance Coddington in the long term. Albeit that there is unavoidable disruption while the building is underway on the site behind the post office. We, as a business, are going in the right direction and it will hopefully become a community store, which everyone can use and enjoy. See you soon.
